In Nsanje, we were very overjoyed to see the people willing and self-motivated to contribute and they got to eat meat for their combined Christmas/ New Year celebration.



Along with meals, our churches practiced weekly fasting for the month of December, ending with a three day fast leading to New Year's overnight crossover prayers.

Chisomo and Joseph are serving in Nsanje. It is hot and dry... they sleep outside the house they rent, and frankly are not used to the climate or the language in that far south region. Pray for them. These young men are faithful and handling the

ministry very well. It grows weekly. They are responsible for a lot! And, Joseph attends school, repeating grade 12. Pray for victory in living out unity and true brotherly love to always prevail, as

they live far from any family. They were having to pay to charge their phone every time it got low, so as a surprise we were able to purchase a small solar system to help alleviate some of their issues.





Gloria has been very much enjoying school. On her Christmas break she was able to implement some of the skills she has been learning!!! To get to Thekerani, she took public transport all by herself. Imagine the freedom a little confidence can add to the life of a blind girl. Here is a picture of her going to the field with her mom and her hoe to cultivate all by herself. You will also see her receiving a phone. At school, she is also



learning to read braille, and she is most excited that soon she will be able to read the Bible for herself.

In Thekerani, our church leaders have begun cooking twice weekly, as our food distribution has officially begun. We cook ten kilograms of rice into porridge in order to feed our growing congregation of about 70 members. Our aim is to feed



our members there, though we are aware food can draw people in a region of hunger. Pray for us, as managing such a project takes much wisdom. It is easy for people to grow greedy or take advantage. Pray against these spirits, and may the feeding program not enable their poverty, but instead promote a mindset change, as we have also asked them to be growing a mango grove. But, if I may disclose, it is easy for them to receive, and harder for them to be responsible of tasks. Pray for my dear Limbani, that he may remain strong and know how to handle such delicate, but oh so important, situations.


In Thekerani, and a little in Nsanje, also, we were able to distribute clothing, as well as blankets to some elderly widows for Christmas!! We desired to also distribute shoes and Bibles, but due to continued devaluation of the Malawi kwacha, our budget could not support it all. PRAISE GOD, we still did manage to buy four Bibles and a song book!! Pray that Bibles become more available at a reasonable price.

In November, five of our young men, who are our pastors, were able to take a long and exciting trip to "the city" and have a leadership conference on the top of Bunda Mountain. The men truly and deeply enjoyed their time of learning, fellowship, prayer, and seeking God through fasting. They grew as a ministry unit and as individuals.
